

Scotstoun

At-a-glance summary

2006-2015

We have conducted four repeat resident surveys in Scotstoun over our ten-year study: the first in 2006 in which 206 residents took part; the second in 2008 in which 159 residents took part; the third in 2011 in which 132 residents took part; and the last survey in 2015 in which 93 residents were interviewed. These surveys included a whole range of questions about how people feel about their homes, their neighbourhood, services in the area, their lifestyle and circumstances and their health and wellbeing.

Over time, this has helped us understand more about the process of neighbourhood regeneration, and to highlight what is working well for communities and what needs more attention.

A selection of the findings for Scotstoun from the four surveys is summarised below.
